Wed June 13– Katie and Holley’s Summer Book Preview!

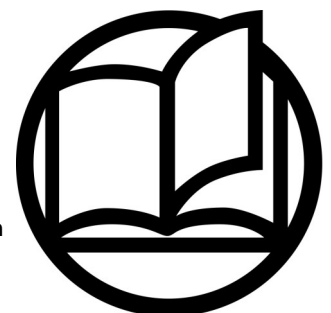
Join our very own librarians, Katie and Holley, as they reveal all of the hottest, most talked about books. Patrons will also be able to place reserves on titles they want to read!

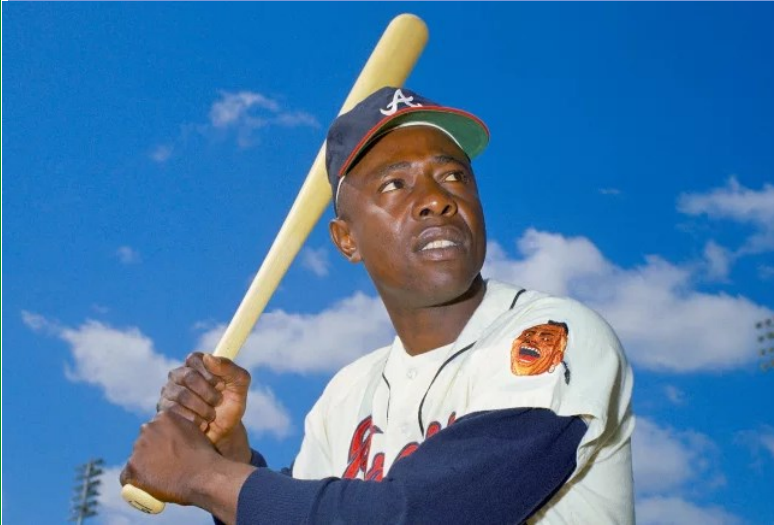
Wed June 20– Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid
